### White-Nose Syndrome Alert - info from the US Fish and Wildlife Service

White-Nose Syndrome (WNS) is an infection that covers affected bats with a white fungus on their muzzles and other parts of their coats. It was discovered in February 2006 in a cave near Albany NY and is currently found in the states of NY, NH, VT, CT, MA, NJ, PA, VA, WV. In some hibernacula, 90 to 100 percent of bats have died. The US Fish and Wildlife Service asks that all caves inside WNS and adjacent states be closed and that people outside WNS areas follow these procedures to prevent the spread of infection:

- 1) Do not handle bats. If you come across live or dead bats with WNS contact email [whitenosebats@fws.gov](mailto:whitenosebats@fws.gov) or contact the nearest USFWS field office (in Columbia, it is the Ecological Services Field Office, Supervisor Charlie Scott, email [ColumbiaES@fws.gov](mailto:ColumbiaES@fws.gov) or 573-234-2132).

2) Prior to outings check <http://www.fws.gov/northeast/wnscavers.html> for updates on procedures and closings.

3) Upon exiting a cave - scrape and brush off dirt and mud from clothes, boots, gear and place in a sealed container or bag till they can be disinfected off-site; remove or change outer clothing before getting in your vehicle and use sanitizer on exposed skin; wash all clothing and washable gear on your machine's hottest cycle (Woolite is best surfactant), then rinse and soak for 10 minutes in a 1part bleach to 9 parts water solution then rinse and air dry; for submersible gear, soak for 10 minutes in bleach solution, then rinse and air dry; for non submersible gear, apply disinfectant (like Lysol all purpose professional cleaner or antibacterial Formula 409) for 10 minutes, then rinse and air dry; for boots, rinse and scrub so all soil and organic matter is removed, then apply bleach solution or other disinfectants for 10 minutes, rinse and air dry; ropes and harnesses should be dedicated to one cave or not used at all- decontaminating vertical equipment has been recommended, but may compromise its integrity. ### Park Superintendent, Jim Gast: Underground Beauty

Many people appreciate the beauty that they see in the park. Spring wildflowers, autumn leaves, prairie restoration, karst topography, riparian zones and majestic bluffs are just a few. There is another area of the park that fewer than 500 people see each year—the Devil's Icebox Cave. The cave is full of wonderful speleothems such as stalactites, stalagmites, curtains, rimstone dams, flowstone, cave pearls, bacon rind, columns, soda straws, popcorn, and one of my personal favorites: helictites. Each of these formations is created by flowing, dripping or standing water plus calcite (calcium carbonate). Each takes hundreds to thousands of years to develop. Many of the ones in the Devil's Icebox are still "growing" today. Another rare formation in the cave is boxwork, a speleogen created by erosion instead of by deposit. Speleothems and speleogens are not the only things that are beautiful in the cave. Different minerals also create different colors. Iron oxide produces a rusty color; hausmannite, which is a manganese oxide, is black, and glauconite is greenish. Something as simple as light reflecting from tiny water droplets on the limestone is also stunning.

### Park Volunteer, Jon Rapp: Mushrooms of Rock Bridge Memorial State Park

Take a walk at Rock Bridge Memorial State Park, and they're there. Do you see or notice them? Maybe not. They are there at your feet and up in a tree. Who or what are they? They are the members of the amazing fungi world, and there are hundreds of different kinds of all shapes, sizes and colors.

Our Native Americans knew much about them, as they made it their business to know about so many things around them. Like the rest of the natural world of trees, wildflowers, animals and insects, mushrooms and fungi quietly do many different things for us. Without them, we'd be lost.

So maybe the next time you're out and about enjoying the chance to be outdoors, you'll notice some. Your curiosity may kick in, and then they have your attention. You may wonder "What is that neat little red-capped mushroom with a white stalk?" You may go home and look it up to see if you can learn more about it. That's what happened to me, Jon Rapp, and Stan Hudson, Rock Bridge State Park volunteers. Along with other volunteer activities, we've enjoyed countless hours exploring the park's many different areas finding and identifying some of the many different mushroom and fungi that are right here.

We've put together a park program that will be held on Saturday, September 26 in which we will describe some of the mushrooms that we've found. This includes some that are edible and some that are poisonous, some that are very common and some that are somewhat rare. The program will include beautiful pictures, some basic identification tools, a brief hike and follow-up discussion. Why not join us? It's a great excuse to get outside and enjoy yourself, and we'll have some "Fun with Fungi".

**September 5, 12, 20, 26, October 3 -Devil's Icebox Wild Cave Tours** - Day-long, adventure-style wild cave tours of Devil's Icebox Cave requiring good physical condition, ability to travel 3.5 to 5 miles round-trip, carry a 65-pound canoe 1/4 mile, and paddle 1/2 mile underground, possibly crawl through tight spaces. You must provide cave-appropriate headlamps, footwear and clothing (extra change a good idea). Fees \$25 - \$40.

**September 8 - Annual Park Information Meeting** - Gilbert Shelter House, 6:30 pm

**September 26 - Let's Have Fun with Fungi** - 10 am to noon, identification workshop, 1 pm, an optional short hike to look for mushrooms in the wild. Free. 12 to adult.

**September 27 - Lost in the Woods** - Noon to 4 pm, Orienteering, map and compass skills, then hiking through woods and across creeks to practice land navigation skills. Bring water and snacks, wear sturdy hiking shoes, long sleeves and pants. Some compasses available for loan. Free. 12 to adult.

**October 17 - Know the Dark** - 7 - 9:30 pm - Learn about night creatures through hands-on activities. Free. 8 to adult

**October 24 - Fall Color Hike** - 12:30 -4:30 pm - Hike the scenic trails of the Gans Creek Wild area (about 3 miles) with the park naturalist. Free. 8 to adult.
