Naturalist News Roxie Campbell, Park Naturalist

A Devil's Icebox Cave Institute group conducted the Fall trip for monitoring pink planarians and their associated aquatic life on September 17th, and reported counting 18 pink planarians! That is the highest number we have recorded since 2007, 15 years ago! We have long suspected that Fall is when they mate and reproduce, so a theory is that in mid-September they gather and are easier to see whereas they are still present at other times of year, but are more dispersed or hidden. Kayla Heady also recorded a highquality video of the pink planarians moving around.

September 1st through October 8th is our primary season to do Devil's Icebox Cave trips. Several trips have been conducted for training, research and interpretive purposes. See next month's Bridge for more.

A follow-up on the video monitoring of gray bats done by staff of the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service: They worked through software issues to refine the estimate to 5,000 to 6,000 gray bats flying out of Devil's Icebox Cave on July 29th. Staff spent considerable time recording bats in both sinkhole openings and evaluating the best methods to employ.

Staff and volunteers worked on several days in September in the Grassland area to control invasive plants including *Sericea lespedeza*, black locust, autumn olive and bush honeysuckle and to prepare firelines. We are working toward burning the eastern and western parts of the Grassland this November to March. We burned the middle last year. Visit the Grassland Trail for fall color in the prairie grasses and for prairie flowers that continue to bloom well past frost and the bees, butterflies and other insects that visit them.

Black Friday Wild Area Hike and Campfire

Join FoRB for a hike on November 25th. We will meet at the Special Use Area at 3:00 PM. We will have guided hikes of the Gans Creek Wild Area until around 4:00 and then have hot dogs and s'mores around a campfire. Don't want to hike, you can still come at 3:00 and sit around the campfire.

The Special Use Area is located at the end of Raylea Lane which is on Highway 163 between the Pierpont Store and Bonne Femme Church Road. If you're coming from Pierpont, Raylea Lane is on the left about 9/10ths of a mile from the store.
