### Naturalist News

#### **Roxie Campbell, Park Naturalist**

Members of the Devil's Icebox Cave Institute (DICI) went into Devil's Icebox Cave, one group on Saturday and another group on Sunday for the joint purposes of monitoring the pink planarians and providing training to DICI members. We conduct the Pink Planarian Project (P3) every spring and fall. This spring's survey yielded a count of 11 pink planarians in the survey plots and three in a timed count for a total of 14. That is a good number for a spring count. It was very exciting for Sunday's group to see, photograph and video record a pink planarian eating an isopod. While we had an observation years ago of a pink planarian eating an amphipod, and have long held that they also eat isopods, it is very good to now have evidence that pink planarians eat isopods.

We also saw salamanders, frogs, fish, crayfish at various places and over 2,000 gray bats clustered in the Water Passage. Roxie led an interpretive trip to The Waterfall.

The group enjoyed The Wade and of course, the sparkling beauty of The Waterfall. We talked about how wonderful it is to absorb the quiet atmosphere of the cave and about how it's up to us to discover the cave's hidden secrets and reveal them to other people who don't venture in. Seventeen members of the Cave Institute participated, received training and had fun!
